Saturday 7th December to Monday 9th December, 2024

Being old, we needed a quiet day at home.


Note: I have increased my swimming back to 30 (double) laps of the pool.

Temple Day: Baphuon

The Baphuon is an interesting temple. It was thought to have been built by Udayadityavaraman (1050 to 1066) but carbon dating has determined it to be older and associated with Suryavarman I (1010 to 1050).

It is a pyramid temple built on a man made hill (not a very big hill!). It is a big temple, though. In it's time, it was gilded with bronze (which would have been a magnificent sight in the sunshine).



Looking east towards the Baphuon, along the long, raised walkway from the beginning of the Terrace of the Elephants.




Side view of the Baphuon, from the man made hill.


In about 1440, the back towers of this structure were taken apart and the stones used to create a reclining Buddha running the width of the building.



It is hard to see with the shadows, but this is the 70m reclining Buddha (head on the left).




These are the steps (east entrance) down to ground level, about 10m high.




This photo shows how night the man made hill is.


The north steps up to the temple towers had animals carvings.








The gopura in a laterite wall on the east had animal carvings too.

The Baphuon was completely taken apart in the 1970s (for restoration). Some 300 000 stones were numbered and laid out. Unfortunately, the Pol Pot regime disrupted the whole country and the French workers had to leave. The plans of the building were lost, but it was put back together beginning in 1996 and taking 16th years.

We saw some wildlife too.
