### Anjali Day and cleaning.


Our apartment was cleaned while we were in Australia, so I had plenty of time for my sewing.

It was a cold ride out to the temples. The morning temperature was about 18C. The early sunshine is bright but there is a smokey haze in the air (due to burning off).







And this is the nearly full moon just setting behind the Bayon. This is the east side, where they have been busy digging out the water reservoirs.

# The single tower of Palilay, shaded by trees.






The shadows and the sunshine can make the carvings stand out.



The trees around Palilay are beautiful.


This may be the last of these pretty weeds this season.





We rode on to Don Mao, to check on the excavation work, only to find it taped off with "No entry" tape. We presume this is because of their excavations.
